Congratulations to Dr. Alezandre Dauphin, recipient of the 2022 Canadian Anesthesiologists Society Humanitarian Award, given in recognition of

excellence in global anesthesiology for his dedication to justice, health equity and the provision of safe anesthetic care for all. Dr. Dauphin helped establish an anesthesia training program in Haiti in 1990, forged a partnership between McMaster University, Mbarara University (Uganda), Makerere University (Uganda) and the Ministry of Health Uganda and was a member of CASIEF and MacGlObAS. His work over 30 years has impacted thousands of patients on three continents.

FACULTY APPOINTMENT



Dr. Ryan Smith, Clinical Chief, Department of Anesthesia Hamilton Health Sciences.

Dr. Smith has contributed substantively to health system administration and the advancement of clinical care at McMaster. He was appointed Practice Lead for Vascular Anesthesiology at Hamilton Health Sciences and was the Chair of the Annual CanAm International Clinical Anesthesia Conference. Dr. Smith designed and integrated a selfassessment component that was accredited by the Royal College and was a member of the Scientific Chair of the annual Ontario Anesthesia Meeting (OMA). He put much effort into the advancement of perioperative clinical care in the creation of the HiRiSE (High Risk Surgical Encounter Clinic) optimization clinic at Vanderbilt. In 2014, he was awarded the Dr. Vince Politi Best Clinical Teacher Award at the end of his first year at McMaster and again in 2017. In 2015 he also received the Clinical Teaching Certificate of Recognition.

Dr. Vandana Vaishnav was awarded the Staff Professional Education Awards Program for Anesthesiologists at HSS to

support a Workshop for Ultrasound Guided Peripheral Nerve Blocks.

Dr. Saroo Sharda received the inaugural **Dr. Pauline Alakija Trailblazer Award** from Equity in Medicine.

us by Zoom, but that's the only part of the course that is virtual.", added Nash.









FACULTY PROMOTIONS



Dr. Jason Busse - Professor, Departments of Anesthesia and Health Research Methodology, Evidence and Impact, July 1, 2022 - Dr. Busse is the Director of the Michael G. DeGroote National Pain Centre, Scientist with the Institute of Pain Research and Care, Associate Director of the Michael G. DeGroote Centre for Medicinal Cannabis Research, Director of Research for Chronic Pain Centre of Excellence for Canadian

Veterans, Pain Lead for the Division of Perioperative Care and Research, and the Associate Chair of Research for the Department of Anesthesia. In 2021, he was awarded the Canada Research Chair in the Prevention and Management of Chronic Pain (Tier II). He maintains a robust research profile in pain research, focused on the prevention and management of chronic pain and has received 44 million dollars in funding, and has a career total of over 200 peer reviewed publications since joining the University. Dr. Busse has been actively involved in teaching and supervising undergraduate, graduate, postgraduate and post-doctoral students and regularly teaches HRM courses in methodology for systematic reviews and randomized controlled trials. He has been recognized for his contributions to education with the 2021 President's Award for Excellence in Graduate Supervision.

Dr. Saeda Nair - Associate Professor July 1, 2022 - Dr. Nair's area of expertise is in hepatobiliary (HPB) anesthesia and perioperative care. As the HPB Anesthesia Lead, she has worked to secure funding for non-invasive cardiac output monitors for use in major hepatobiliary cases leading to better hemodynamic and fluid management in



complex patients with multiple comorbidities. As the Anesthesia Lead for Enhanced Recovery after Surgery (ERAS) she worked on incorporating ERAS protocols into the QBP-Hysterectomy, consistent with best practice. She is a member of the National Surgical Quality Improvement Program (NSQIP) that reviews data of increased rate of organ/space infection following hepatobiliary surgery at Juravinski Hospital. She is a collaborator for a research project, PeRioperative Optimization with Nutritional Supplements in Patients Undergoing GastRointEStinal Surgery for Cancer (PROGRESS): a Randomized Placebo Controlled Feasibility Study and part of a collaborative project with Cancer Care Ontario. She is collaborating on a randomized controlled trial looking at the effects of intrathecal analgesia versus patient-controlled analgesia on post-operative pain in patients undergoing laparoscopic liver resection,. Dr. Nair has a strong interest in education and been actively involved in education as an MF tutor, the Undergraduate Site Coordinator at the Juravinski Hospital as well as an Academic Advisor for the Anesthesia Residency Program, a member of the Competence Committee and a Trouble Rounds Facilitator.



Dr. Summer Syed - Associate Clinical Professor, July 1, 2022. Dr. Syed's expertise is in cardiac anesthesia, transesophageal echocardiography (TEE), perioperative anticoagulation and blood conservation management. Her research in thrombosis and hemostasis, perioperative outcomes, and blood management has been highly cited and she has over 80 peer-reviewed publications.

She has also written guideline papers on management of perioperative anticoagulants and was the 1st anesthesiologist member of Thrombosis Canada. Dr. Syed has served as the clinical lead for cardiac anesthesia at HHS and has introduced new techniques such as perioperative TEE and created transfusion protocols for cardiac surgery in collaboration with the cardiac surgical and perfusion group. Her research has allowed the use of point-of-care rapid testing devices for the OR to develop response algorithms in Meditech. Dr. Syed was the director of the Cardiac Anesthesia Fellowship program 2007 – 2015 where she developed a rigorous academic and clinical program. She is Chair of the Cardiovascular & Thoracic section for the Canadian Anesthesiologists' Society and has been an invited speaker for many local, national and international meetings.

MESSAGE FROM THE UNDERGRADUATE ANESTHESIA PROGRAM DIRECTOR



Message From Chief Anesthesia Resident – Jordan Albaum PGY-5



General Experiences and Advice:

Anesthesia residency training is an exciting, fast-paced and high-intensity adventure. Your overall experience is a culmination of the people you meet and work with, the patients you see and treat, the skills and knowledge you harness, and the challenges you overcome on your path to success. Despite the demands of training, residency is filled with much joy and satisfaction. Some of the best parts of residency here include:

- My fellow residents. Anesthesia residents are a tight knit family that celebrate every success and share every misstep in both our academic and personal lives. You develop a robust support system that truly is second to none. We also get the opportunity to work with residents from other specialties and from all over the world. Getting to share in their knowledge and culture is a true honour.
- Personal growth. You will learn a lot about yourself over the 5 years of residency. There are endless opportunities for learning and as you find yourself dealing with new and exciting situations, you will constantly push the boundaries of your comfort zone and truly see how much you are capable of (both personally and professionally).
- Teaching and Mentorship. Being a resident puts you in a privileged position to help support the next generation of medical students and junior residents. Whether it is through formal mentorship programs at McMaster or informal conversations during clinical skills teaching or in the OR, there is lots to be gained by both mentor and mentee from these unique relationships.

There are still unfortunately parts of residency that we all must go through. Some of the most challenging aspects include:

- Call Requirements. Despite call being one of the most valuable learning opportunities in residency, it certainly taxes your body and mind. It often takes away weekends and evenings when you would rather be with your family or friends, and often on anesthesia time spent in the hospital is without rest.
- Service. Although we are learning, a large portion of our training is service-based. We are a key part to ensuring the healthcare system runs smoothly, despite the toll it sometimes takes on us. Service can be draining, and balancing that with other aspects of training such as research, teaching, etc. can be overwhelming. It is important to frequently re-evaluate your schedule and be realistic with yourself about what you can and cannot handle.

Finally, always keep an open mind and try new things. There are many roads that lead to the same place and learning different ways of doing things (especially in anesthesia) can benefit you greatly. (*cont'd on next page*)

Talk to as many people as possible and be a sponge from everyone. This includes not only your anesthesia staff members, but surgeons, other residents, nurses, AAs, RTs, etc. Everyone has something to teach you and although 5 years seems like a long time, it will be over before you know it!

Preparing for Royal College

The following Royal College advice has been handed down through many years of the program and by those with much more wisdom and knowledge than myself.

- See as much as you can during your training and read around your cases. Our exposure to cases (basic and complex) at McMaster is exceptional and provides a solid foundation for what we need to know.
- Starting to study can feel overwhelming, set a good study schedule and STICK TO IT. No
 matter how tempting it may to take a week or evening off when you are drained, keep
 up with your fellow colleagues and don't let yourself fall behind. It is all about how
 much time you put in.
- Trust in the system that has been laid out for you by your predecessors. A lot of times it can feel like you are not actually making progress or learning anything, but you are. The system has been working for years and will work for you too.
- Maintain your sanity by relying on your friends, family, and especially your colleagues. Try to find time to take care of yourself. From a former chief "While this exam is essentially the gateway to your future life, in the end it is just an exam."

2022 CANADA GAIRDNER WIGHTMAN WINNER

Dr. Deborah Cook (SJH) is the winner of the prestigious 2022 Canada Wightman Gairdner Award for her ground-



breaking research in the treatment of patients in the intensive care unit (ICU). The award is in recognition of outstanding leadership in medicine and medical science throughout her career. Dr. Cook has pioneered improvements in ICU patient management that has both reduced the risk of complications and enhanced end-of-life care for those with fatal illnesses or injuries. As the first Canadian critical care specialist trained in clinical epidemiology and biostatistics, the results of Cook's research are now standard practice internationally in preventing and treating gastrointestinal bleeding, blood clots and ventilator-associated pneumonia in ICU patients. She grew her reputation as a trailblazer early in her career by working to improve end-of-life care for patients, even when some senior colleagues questioned whether it was a legitimate field of inquiry. Message from the Associate Chair

We are delighted to provide this research report to members of the Department of Anesthesia. The past year has seen continued challenges because of the COVID-19 pandemic, which included remote meetings and teaching, and delays in clinical trials. More recently, there has been

a return to in-person meetings and resumption of recruitment for studies and we remain hopeful that these positive trends will continue. The Canadian Pain Society meeting was held in person this May in Montreal and the Department was well represented with over 25 posters and a podium presentation. We have continued to offer the on-line Fundamentals of Health Research Methodology course, initiated by Dr. James Paul and led by Dr. Li Wang, and to build important collaborations both within McMaster and with other academic organizations. In recognition of these efforts, our Department was awarded its first Canada Research Chair to Dr. Jason Busse, in 2021, in the prevention and management of chronic pain. Key accomplishments in the past year include a guideline and associated evidence synthesis on the role of therapeutic cannabis in the management of chronic pain [1,2] a 14,831 patient prospective cohort study to inform the prevalence and predictors of persistent post-surgical incisional pain [3] a randomized controlled trial of remote monitoring vs. usual care after surgery that found significant reduction in medication errors and improved post-surgery pain,[4] and a metaresearch analysis that found 30% of randomized trials that launch are prematurely discontinued and 21% go unpublished.[5] In addition, Health Canada awarded our department funding to update the 2017 Canadian Guideline for Opioids and Chronic Pain, which has been cited 520 times since publication. Most of the Department's studies involve patient partners, and all involve clinical experts who play critical roles by ensuring that research questions are relevant and timely and will address important questions that can improve patient care. We look forward to working with our colleagues to advance anesthesia research and build on McMaster University's international reputation for evidence-based clinical care.

REFLECTIONS ON THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ANESTHESIA AT MCMASTER UNIVERSITY



Dr. Don Catton, First Professor & Chair of the Dept. of Anesthesia

Fifty years ago, the academic Department of Anesthesia at McMaster University was officially established with the formal opening of the McMaster University Medical Centre (MUMC) on May 27, 1972. (1) Dr. Don Catton was appointed as the first Professor and Chair of the new academic department. Under his leadership, he brought in faculty champions to establish the founding framework, including Drs. J.M. Thistlewood, J.R.A. Rigg, D.A. Morison, J.B. Forrest, G.L. Dunn, R. Rajagopalan and Hewson (2,3). While the Hamilton hospitals had been training anesthesia residents prior to the establishment of the academic department, it was Dr. David Morison, the first anesthesia residency director, who integrated the training across all of the hospitals and establish the formal McMaster University academic anesthesia residency training program.

It is important to remember that clinical anesthesia practice in Hamilton dated well before 1972 with the establishment of

the Hamilton General Hospital in 1882, St Joseph's Hospital in 1890 and the Mount Hamilton Hospital in 1917 (later renamed and amalgamated with Nora Henderson Hospital (1954) as the Henderson Hospital in 1965). Over the years, these hospitals have endured and expanded through many iterations into its current structure of the Hamilton Health Sciences (McMaster University Medical Centre - McMaster

Children's Hospital, The Juravinski Hospital and Cancer Centre, The Hamilton General Hospital) and St. Joseph's Healthcare Hamilton (Charlton Ave, King St and West 5th campuses). The incredible changes and advances in anesthesia clinical practices over the years to its present day state-of-the-art level are a true testament to the tremendous drive for excellence and innovation by the members of our department. There was also a strong academic anesthesia tradition in Hamilton that predated the founding of the university Department of Anesthesia. Dr R Fraser, chief of anesthesia in the 1940's at St Joseph's Hospital and Dr. F Ruston, anesthesiologist at HGH, published papers on anesthesia practice in the *Canadian Medical Association Journal* and the fledgling *Canadian Journal of Anesthesia*, in the very first edition no less!

In reflecting on how far the Department of Anesthesia at McMaster University has evolved over the last 50 years, we took the opportunity to review our historical archives that are available on our website (click **here** to access).

We were amazed at the treasure trove of information available. In addition to timelines that detail the history of the department intertwined with the history of the specialty itself, there are priceless interviews with faculty members, including one with Dr. Marion Morgan who was the first female anesthetist in Hamilton when she started in 1947. In listening to their interviews, it is fascinating to reflect on how things have changed but how some of the same struggles and

challenges fundamental to the practice of anesthesia still exist.

REFLECTIONS CONT'D

Over the past 50 years, the McMaster Department of Anesthesia has proven to be powerhouses in education, clinical practice and research. Major accomplishments include the first FHS department to initiate simulation-based learning and training (which has since grown into the multidisciplinary Centre for Simulation-Based Learning), one of the first specialty programs to transition to the Royal College's competency-based medical education, creation of the first iBook in anesthesia, and the international partnerships for anesthesia residency training in Haiti, Uganda and Guyana as well as recognition of our faculty with national teaching awards. Major advances in clinical practices include the establishment of the first medical acupuncture clinic for chronic pain care, and the creation of the contemporary medical acupuncture for health professionals program that has attracted local and international participants annually since 1998, the advancement of ultrasound-guided anesthesia, particularly the pioneering of the ESP block with international recognition, the establishment of the National Pain Centre and the Institute for Pain Research and Care, advances in chronic and multidisciplinary pain care as well as the use of transesophageal echocardiography and point of care ultrasound. Our faculty have also been recognized with national teaching and clinical practice awards.

We have had a tradition of ground breaking international research in pain, cardiac anesthesia, regional anesthesia and perioperative care to name but a few. Examples include the landmark paper published in Anesthesiology in 1990 by Dr. Jay Forrest (lead author) that was a multicentre prospective randomised trial of over 17,000 patients comparing outcomes of different general anesthetic agents (4) and involvement in the MAVS and POISE studies (3). With the tremendous growth in our research infrastructure and faculty over the past twenty years, we have also expanded our research networks, publications and multiple grant awards. This includes the SPOR networks on Chronic Disease, and the major CIHR grant for chronic pain as well as leading the national guidelines for opioid use and the awarding of the Canada Research Chair in the prevention and Management of Chronic Pain. There are merely some highlights as there many more accomplishments in the education, clinical and research realm that are too numerous to capture in this limited format.

We encourage everyone to delve back into our history to remind us of the proud traditions that provided the foundations for the McMaster Department of Anesthesia. We look forward to celebrating all the past and present members of the Department at the 50th Anniversary Gala Event on November 18 and all the exciting developments ahead!
